- Services: To make available services that counties can take advantage of that save their staff time and money

















## **About MAC: Leadership**

- Board of 16 members elected by commissioners
- Two seats from each of six regions ensure broad representation
- MAC Board meets four times a year: Legislative Conference, June, Annual Conference, November
- Elections held in August/September at Annual Conference





## **About MAC: Policy Development**

## **Legislative Update: 2023 Priorities**

- Revising the Open Meetings Act to Meet the Demands of the 21st Century
- Creating a Fair Revenue Sharing System for Counties
- **Enacting Reforms to Ensure Proper Funding of Local** Courts
- Increasing Resources for Juvenile Justice Services
- Compensating Local Governments for Funds Diverted by the Veterans Property Tax Exemption
- Revamping the PPT Exemption to Provide Annual Reimbursement to Locals





### FY24 state budget

- Revenue sharing: 5% ongoing increase; 2% for public safety
- Child Care Fund: Community-based services to 75%
- \$72M for MIDC Standard 8 (pay for defense attorneys)
- \$25M increase for Essential Local Public Health Services
- \$80M GF for bridge bundling program
- \$181.6M for 27 individual critical infrastructure projects
- \$20M for environmental justice and contaminated site clean-up
- \$46M to implement Proposals 1 & 2
- \$30M in incentive grants to counties to coordinate multijurisdictional early voting

#### 2024 forecast

- Decreased Democratic majority
- Mayoral elections





### Revenue Sharing Trust Fund

- House Bills 4274-75
  - 8% of first 4 percentage points of sales tax
  - Retain current split with CVTs
  - Bring back hundreds of townships in formula
  - o Passed unanimously out of committee
  - Awaiting vote on House floor in October





## **Public Safety Trust Fund**

- House Bills 4605-06
  - 1% of first 4 percentage points of sales tax
  - ~\$110M for city/township police
  - Disbursement based on 3-year average of violent crimes
  - MAC seeking money from fund to go directly to counties





### Veteran property tax exemption

#### Policy changes

- SB 176: One and done filing
- SB 330: Assessor audit every 3 years
- SB 364: Expands BOR approval of qualified errors to include denial of exemption for surviving spouse
- All headed to governor

#### Reimbursement (HBs 4984, HB 4984-85, SBs 95-96, 454-455)

- Create refundable income tax credit payable to local unit or veteran, if vet paid taxes
- Treasury still opposed
- Awaiting committee votes



## PPT exemption reimbursements

 In 2021, state enacted increase for Personal Property Tax (PPT) exemption, thereby reducing revenue to locals by ~\$75M each year




- House Bills 4553-54 & Senate Bill 331
  - Reimbursement methodology for increase in exemption from \$80,000 to \$180,000
  - Funded through use tax revenue
  - Passed both chambers, awaiting governor's signature



## Juvenile justice reforms

- House Bills 4624-4643 and Senate Bills 418-437
  - CCF reimbursement from 50% to 75% for communitybased services
  - Expands diversion eligibility- risk screening and mental health screening
  - Expands MIDC to juveniles
  - Requires SADO to oversee appellate defense
  - Eliminates most fines and fees for juveniles
  - Expected to be on governor's desk by November





## Clean energy legislation

- Senate Bills 271-276
  - o Priority of Gov. Whitmer
  - o 60% renewable energy by 2032
  - 100% renewable by 2040 (initial goal: 100% by 2035)
  - In Senate Energy Committee





### Solar/wind siting

#### House Bills 5120-23 & Senate Bills 585-588

- Preempt local control for solar and wind facilities, granting sole siting authority to the MPSC for
- o Projects >50 megawatts
- o Locals will have ability to intervene but will be expensive
- Versions that leave House Energy Committee will not be final version (amendments on House floor or possibly Senate)
- o Sponsor wants bills on governor's desk before adjournment
- Solar developers want expedited permitting
- MAC opposes any version that preempts locals

#### MAC counterproposal

- o If county has ordinance in place, developer must adhere to it
- o If a county does not adopt an ordinance, then PSC regulates



## Statewide septic code

#### House Bill 4479

- Michigan only state without one
- Mandates septic inspections every 5 years
- Local public health departments will conduct inspections (may outsource to third-party inspectors)
- Requires counties to repeal point of sale ordinances
- Financial assistance available to homeowners below 400% of federal poverty line





## **Binding arbitration**

#### House Bill 4438

- Expands PA 312 to corrections officers
- MAC opposes any expansion
- PERA provides for bargaining rights without tying county hands
- Passed Senate with a substitute to include all MCOLES-certified officers
- Headed to governor for expected enactment
